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ECONOMIC RAW FOOD FOR THE BRAIN

About a fortnight ago, a tearful young lady had put a message up on facebook complaining that she was tired of being disposable, that nobody had any feelings anymore and she did not feel that she could live like that.

I very quickly replied that her generation had been brought up for a transient existence because transience is good for the economy, and that if she expected to change anything, she was just going to have to rebel. She did not reply. A good example of this symptom of the Western economic disease is one of IKEA's campaigns, which entreated the viewer to get divorced and buy some furniture. This is a fairly advanced gag for the European market, but an important one.

I am sure this phenomenon, of personal disposability and the need to continuously upgrade yourself, started during my generation or even earlier in the USA, but in the UK even people two years younger than me show a marked difference to people of my own age. The sublimation of cultural influence is so finely tuned now, that even 20 odd months make a difference. Where I got much the same post war creative children's programming as my older peers, I noted as far back as the 1980s that colours in newer TV shows were more akin to sales signs and children were being discouraged from actually making anything in favour of showing off another purchase. I was met with dismay in the 1990s when I made a serious complaint to the BBC about it.

It is very sad, and very bad for fulfilling personal development that we are now training people to despise menial jobs and assume that the answer to all ills is to purchase happiness. It is equally sad to destroy the sense of commitment that, despite sacrificing a sense of day to day contentment, provided people with the stability required to move beyond Candy Crush Saga, to discuss more important things and perhaps volunteer to do something about them instead of assuming powerlessness.

Being serious is now considered to be something undesirable and unattractive. People like this poor girl feel that their emotions are somehow unacceptable, and that feeling anything renders them worthless. Compare this with even fifty years ago, and you will see exactly how much you have been manipulated.

Post 90s babies may not even have access to people who remember when it was OK to have feelings and make lousy Valentine's cards (or whatever else) for each other as it now seems to be desirable to throw the elderly into a care home. Boys are now deprived of the company of their fathers, fixing broken items or inventing new ones, because the traditional skill level has been depleted for the benefit of the Political Economic Paradise we are so fortunate to live in. Now they are supposed to jump into the second car and buy something new to keep somebody somewhere (else) in work. All so that your government can show you another couple of percent growth and keep you voting for them. You can also count yourself responsible for perpetual war and student loans, since these are also part of the economic machine that is running out of steam.

I, perversely, count myself lucky to be in a position to show you exactly how much you have been conned. Time is money – no, money is time, and time is worth a lot more than cash to you if you know how to use it effectively and have sufficient

motivation to do something with it. Nobody is powerless, and nobody is worth more than you just because they are good at extracting cash from their employer or anybody else they do business with. Don't ever let anybody tell you otherwise, stop comparing yourself to them and stop worrying about what people might say if you actually care about something. You may well surprise yourself.

YOU CREATED THE ONE PERCENT

As promised, here is your checklist for redirecting finance in a more positive direction. It is important for you to circulate it to as many people as possible to encourage them to do the same. You can do as little or as much as you choose, but the more people redirecting their lives away from feeding what is now a seriously malfunctioning machine the better. The 1 percent that everyone complains about only became the 1 percent because the 99 percent put them there.

My suggestion is that you do one thing at a time, so that you do not become bogged down with the details.

Open an account with an ethical bank, again I have posted links to some of the banks which market themselves as ethical investors on the [Better Person Project](#). You will find them under the appropriate drop down menu. The reason I suggest this before doing anything else is because changing all your monthly payments over to a new account is a pain in the neck, and considering the other slightly more time consuming things I will be adding to this list, it is important that you start with this.

This means that you will be encouraging positive rather than negative investments from the banks that you choose to deal with. If we can encourage a swing towards ethical investment, it will influence the more mainstream banks to do the same. One person matters. One thousand people matter. One million people and we have actually achieved something. You matter. Open the account. If your country is not represented, find the bank in your country that invests ethically and add it to the website, please.

In the event that you hold savings, consider investing a little in a 'lend with care' or social capital project as you will achieve two things – first, the person you are lending to will not have to go to a bank and give them more business, and second, you will get a much better interest rate than the banks have been offering. Again, I have added links on the Better person project site, and if you find more, or better ones, you are free to add them without fear of my scraping your data, or whatever.

Stop shopping with large retailers such as supermarkets, 'iconic' brands etc. The big global fashion labels in particular, are owned by about 6 investment companies. Not that they are particularly evil investment companies, but if you wish to achieve an impact in terms of diversifying the market, you want to feed the smaller companies until they are in a position to compete.

Supermarkets are a menace, because you are lulled into giving them a proportion of your income every week, so one company benefits disproportionately by cutting costs or advertising more widely. This is easy for a raw foodist, because chances are if you are shopping in a supermarket, you are paying too much already. Non raw foodies will find it more difficult.

I completely understand as I sometimes do the shopping at 3am and Asda (Walmart) is the only one open, but if we are to start making a dent in this, it starts at home. Reducing your spend to the minimum and using your spending power to encourage competitors is key.

As a side effect, smaller retailers are frequently located in places where it is more practical to walk, and you may be able to use your car less.

Communications companies are just as outgrown. Investigate smaller companies who offer the same services that you currently enjoy. It is worth considering spending slightly more in order to grow a competing company, rather than get additional TV channels that you do not even watch thrown in as part of a deal to maintain the economic status quo with a company like Sky, Virgin or the equivalent.

It is a question of habit, and being aware that the price of convenience is the difference between being forced into a minimum wage job by a giant retailer, or opening a store yourself, if that is what makes you happy. Just as thinking before you eat makes a difference, so does thinking before you let a penny out of your wallet.

Bear in mind, if you choose to do this, that it was not entirely your fault that you were sucked into a situation where your government became powerless against the businesses that supported them. If we can get around the time consuming problems associated with rechanneling our own money, it will make it much easier for the next wave of people that get on board.

IMMIGRATION AND THE GLOBAL ECONOMY

Tonight, I witnessed a rather trashy piece of BBC programming about the far right group Britain First, who have 933k followers on Facebook. They have 933k followers because they circulated a lot of soft and cuddly pictures of babies and kittens in their early days, and because many people in Britain are concerned about multiculturalism. The tweets on this topic have been fascinating.

Thankfully, Britain is quite far past its empire building phase, and has handed most of its acquisitions back to their rightful owners, also successfully negotiating favourable relationships with many, on both sides. The military relationship with the USA in its empire building phase, is, in my view a mistake which has eroded the UK's reputation abroad enormously. The public are footing the bill for enormous defence spending, for a cause which benefits a far richer country. You cannot really be British and anti-war, since defence income and expenditure overall constitutes a rather large proportion of our GDP. War has become an economic exchange X number of lives for Y percentage increase in income due to international deals we are never informed about as members of the public, funding a limited number of defence producers and associated business.

Although Britain seems to have a strong sense of culture, the reality is very different. Scotland is a vastly different country from England, for example, and Wales and Northern Ireland also have very different views on everything from immigration, militarism, our relationships with Europe and the USA. It is for this reason that Britain First, really ought to be called England First, since the idea of our being a Christian country with basic common values appears rather alien in Scotland. Scottish people are very factional, we love arguing, and the idea of us all having the same values is somewhat laughable since our internal history involves us feeding each other excellent dinners and then brawling over some imaginary slight. We fight a lot, and then laugh a lot, making us excellent candidates for cannon fodder for the English masters in a military situation.

Having said this, people that I know, living only ten minutes down the road from me, are also concerned about multiculturalism. The local area that they live in has always been home to immigrants, but the proportion of immigrants has risen to more than 40%, with the local social housing being allocated at a rate of 27%. Scottish culture is so strong, and so fractious, that it is probably a good thing that our local council was so keen to attract the funding that goes with these immigrants, since they are treated far better here and it is a lot easier to integrate. Having said this, the influx of new inhabitants has put rather a lengthy strain on an area which also has a higher proportion of alcohol and drug hostels than the rest of the city. This melting pot has resulted in an area which is now dangerous at night, and on my last visit, walking down a main road in broad daylight resulted in a spot of mild sexual assault.

From a sociological perspective, racism is caused by concentrating immigrants in such areas. New residents often have little money, are not property owners and are placed in often poorly kept rented property. This leads the people in the lower income

brackets to perceive them as competition for limited resources, who do not keep their properties well and generally drag down an area. This is not a new thing, and from the data I have looked at, is fairly common to any newly formed community of competing interests.

Britain First would like this to become a nationwide view. It would be a lot smarter of them if they examined what is happening across Europe, rather than relying on an antiquated idea that 'we don't want your sort here.' As someone who specialised in ethnic minorities in my former employment, I can tell you that immigrants are, in fact a form of respectable poor, brought in to sustain benefits and mask the ineffectiveness of the minimum wage by being forced into employment situations that the native long term unemployed would be shocked by. And yet they manage, because all those scruffy shops that the locals complain about make sure these people can still eat. One group that I interviewed, were working for less than most people spend on football shirts and Sky TV, still managing to send money home, and sleeping four to a room. Employed by their landlord/uncle, they were also socially isolated by the hours they worked, meaning that it was news to them that this was not how most people live in Scotland. It is by no means an easy decision to make, to leave your country and head for another to start again.

The real problem is that the systems put in place, and explanations given to people as to why these people are coming, are somewhat lacking and open to exploitation by local government, quangos and 'charities' alike, creating even more resentment from the struggling locals. The streets are not paved with gold, instead the streets hide the underground economy, which does not pay well but maintains everyone else's pensions whilst breeding the next generation of natives.

So much for the micro view, the macro view seems to be that we are rapidly headed for a one world government, dictated to by large companies, requiring a cheap labour force. This means that the entire structure of political economy itself is under reconstruction. TISA TPP and TTIP are the first steps towards this, which is why we should be concerned.

Join the dots – cultural dilution through mass immigration weakens the sense of community, making it much easier to make massive changes to the global economy without much resistance. Mass immigration is likely to cause the public to swing to the right, making it easier for business to influence government. Giving large business interests carte blanche to legally force us to do their bidding, however much they try to mask it as regulation to somehow benefit us, is a really really bad idea, which we enable when we decide that we really do not like immigration and vote to the right.

As I have been saying, spending your money with big businesses is also a bad idea, because you are paying for your own destruction, not only in terms of opportunities for self employment, as the barriers to entry will swiftly follow the 'super-regulation' they are introducing; Health will be dictated by pharmaceutical companies, the food you eat dictated by large manufacturers and chemical/GMO company interests, so unless you take up a fresh diet of premium quality food, the products on offer will be available from the same six or so companies you probably buy 80% of your shopping from right now.

The idea of us embracing diversity becomes rather laughable when you consider the lack of diversity our collective futures hold in the hands of the interests of a very few, very rich people. It all comes down to the same thing – You created the one percent, and very soon you will not be able to destroy it, unless you decide to take action by protesting your nation's trade deals and redirecting your money away from the real villains; defence manufacturers, chemical, pharmaceutical, big brand manufacturers of food, retailers who support the exploitation of people who would really rather live in their own country, thanks all the same.

Forget immigration as being the problem – division is the problem. The one percent are rubbing their bellies, smoking their cigars and imagining that you cannot see the wood for the trees. Getting sucked into a culture of mutual blame and division about immigration will definitely not save you. Waking up and doing something about the political economy that you vote for, the money you spend and your attitude to the person standing next to you might.

THE BRITISH CLASS SYSTEM IS UNEMPLOYED

As someone who studied eleven centuries of international economic history in the course of my reading, I am a bit of a fan of feudalism. Feudalism is under-rated. On a good day, feudalism works a lot better than capitalism.

Contentious, *qui moi*?

It may surprise you to learn that after the Black Death, when many villages and feudal settlements were empty as a result of the deaths of the occupants, the contents of the cottages revealed, in many places, a far higher standard of living than expected.

Ask an unemployed urban dweller now whether they would feel hard done by with their own rabbit warren, space for a cow and some hens, hand me down crystal, clothing and metalware from the 'big house', a four day working week for the local lord, followed by a day for the church to cover education and medical treatment for the family, their wives doing cottage-based piece work for the travelling merchants, and they will admit that our marvellous capitalist system is not treating them particularly well compared with medieval peasants. Capitalism and socialism are mutually dependent. If you believe otherwise, you are being conned.

The difference with feudalism and the reason that it could not be sustained, was that it was based on the availability of land, which is why the British strove so hard to acquire quite so much of it. The British class system, complete with privilege, horse skills, hunting etc was set up for exploration, not industrialisation. Given a chunk of uncharted territory, your average toff was able to feed his workers, organise them to build shelter, reroute rivers and eventually plan out a wider agricultural and transport strategy thanks to their having been given land to manage over several generations, something I touched on in *Best Scandal Ever*.

Now, of course, there are far too many people for us to benefit from a feudal system with a local landowner to blame if things go wrong. In the event that the reformation had not happened as a result of urbanisation, the catholic peasantry would have been starved and tithed out of this formerly comfortable life. The British class system, which worked so well for the Georgian and Victorian explorers and their military-imperialist tendencies, has now been reduced to a small number of corrupt individuals who, rather than believing in duty, the preservation of land, and the glory of the nation, now believe in reducing those who do not benefit from capitalism to criminal behaviour in order to survive. Instead of national pride, we have a system which supports contempt for the poor and disabled, offering benefits to cronies in the fields of banking, weapons manufacture, construction and of course, the politicians who ensure that their instructions are carried out.

What happened then, to the idea of 'things being better when gentlemen were in charge,' a cry uttered by my neighbour within my lifetime. When the gentlemen were in charge of my city, they dutifully gifted their estates on death to become parks. Can anyone imagine George Osborne gifting his wealth to anyone? I have met some of the older members of David Cameron's family, and whilst they would not gift their wealth, they certainly donated quite a proportion of their property for the benefit of

the military during World War 2 and had a sense of humility whilst doing it. I cannot imagine the same can be said for the Head Prefect, who spends his time whining to his local council whilst recommending that the rest of us get fracked.

So why retain faith in the Great British machine, when the Great British machine no longer works? Clearly the answer is to remove cronies, whether they be Tories, sustaining each other's family businesses by promoting war, forgiving banker's errors, indulging in not-so-secret talks with corporate lobbyists before promoting policies that serve only themselves? In the meantime, they feign caring by retaining some of the worst Labour policies. Labour, as a party, is all but dead, they wait to be told what to think. Consensus, as I have always said, is not a healthy or progressive state of affairs for any party, nor is attempting to centralise a country that cannot, and should not, be centralised, particularly not for the benefit of London, at the expense of the entire UK.

Honesty, in addition to duty, have gone out of fashion, unfortunately at a time when we are more aware than ever before exactly how many lies, and how many mistakes, we are at the mercy of. Is it not time that we took some initiative to get our country back on track? We used to be great, not a puppet sideshow, whispering in the ear of the USA to scrape a few arms sales to line the pockets of a few more fat cats, smoking in the private member's club right next to your politicians.

LEARNING FROM IDIOTS

The recent use of idiocy in the USA to keep Donald Trump in the media, and overspill back in Scotland, is not the only thing which has caused me to ponder the value of being an idiot. Given that in terms of my emotional attachment to Wolfe, I too am a kind of professional idiot, I am now pondering the value of idiocy.

Trump has taken some minor financial hits in the last couple of days, Oman and Scotland have reported third party business losses as a result of his shameless self promotion and moronic self-regard. Recently, of course, we in the UK have taken to inviting foreign money to bolster the luxury market and conceal the fact that economically speaking, our government does not even remember the simple economic principles of Maggie Thatcher. Yes, she dictated that it was a good idea to kill off unsustainable nationalised industry, but nobody in the current government seems to have put this together with encouraging small to medium sized business, proportionately enormous employers, with enhancements to investibility and encouragement of the general population to risk everything replanting the economic garden by starting small businesses.

Perhaps we should have a Chancellor that can count, with a memory of thirty years ago so that he does not miss this crucial detail. Instead he is starving the poor in order to fund crappy and equally corrupt Labour PFI policy damage and fund his cronies in the defence industry, whilst everyone apparently sits at home and wonders why their respective riots are not reported on the media. We in Scotland are well aware that the media is suppressing information from little England.
