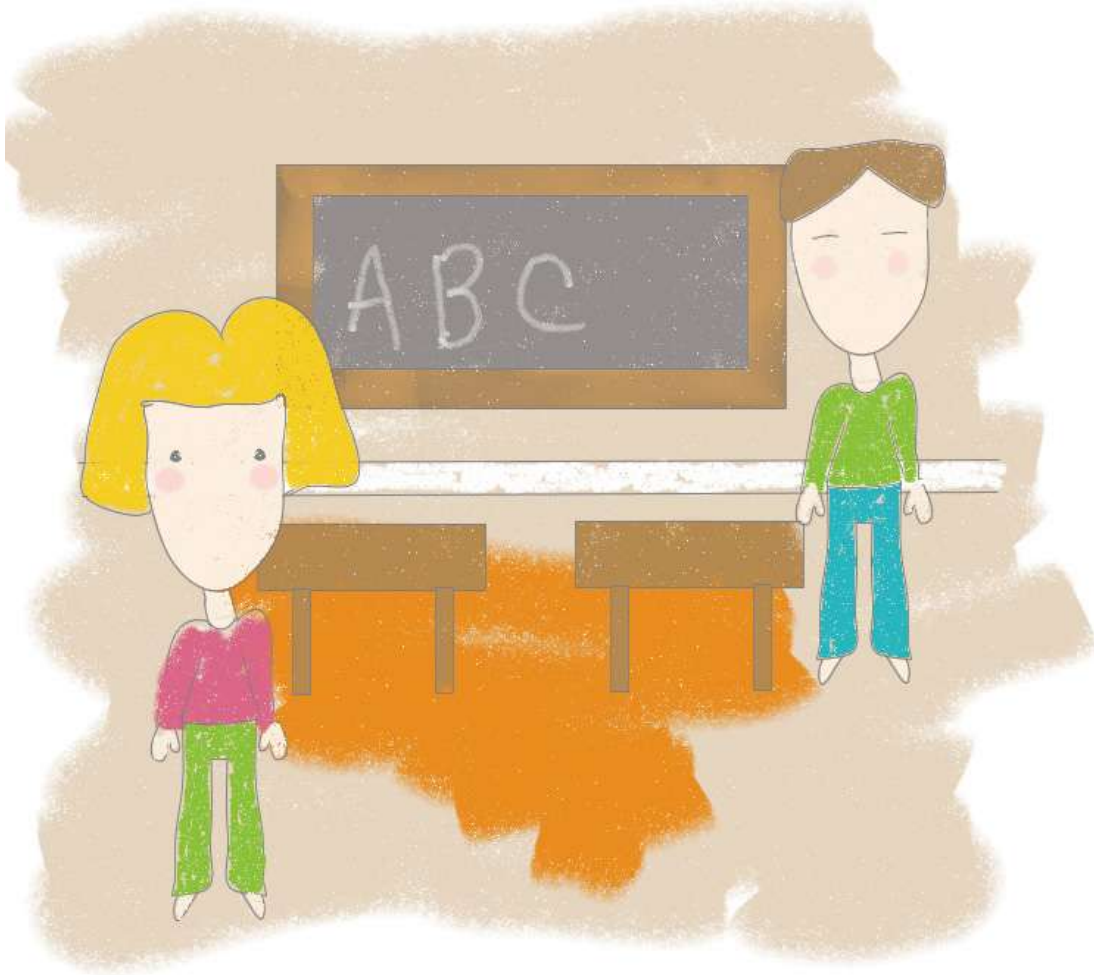
“Be kind and compassionate
